

Appendix A: State-Run Judicial Programs

All states have judicial programs for their own judges. State programs vary. Below is a brief description of a few state programs, followed by a list of all state programs.

State	Program Name	Description
Ohio	The Judicial College of Ohio	Founded in 1976 by the Ohio Supreme Court, the program offers a wide range of courses for judges, magistrates and non-judicial court personnel. Topics covered include domestic violence, hearsay, jury management and capital cases. Courses are offered in person at various locations around the state and online.
Massachusetts	The Flaschner Judicial Institute	A charitable, non-profit organization that provides judicial education, the Institute “works to assist both new and experienced Massachusetts judges throughout their judicial careers in their continuing education and professional development.” ¹ To meet these goals, the Institute collaborates with local, state and national organizations to offer courses on substantive and procedural law, recognizing bias and achieving fairness, ethics, and bench/bar relations. ² In developing programs, judges partner with lawyers, academics, physicians and others. Institute programs have utilized a variety of in-person and online formats. Courses are generally free of charge for judges (note that most courses are open only to judges).
North Carolina	The North Carolina Judicial College	Part of the University of North Carolina’s (UNC) School of Government, the College relies on UNC faculty members to teach its courses and is supported by the Administrative Office of the Courts. The College provides both in-person and online education and training for judges, magistrates, and clerks of court. Topics covered include corrections, evidence, family law, and motor vehicle law. ³
